MOVING FROM MARGINS TO MAINSTREAM

Built on economic, social, cultural, and environmental objectives, the social solidarity economy rebalances the priorities of economic development with a focus on the value of people over profits. And while Québec is a world leader in the social solidarity economy, English-speaking communities in the province have been less involved.

SEEnet offers services and programs to meet these economic, social, and environmental goals within Québec's English-speaking communities.

ADVANCING INNOVATIVE IDEAS

SEEnet strategically mobilizes community knowledge, leverages available resources, and builds capacity for English-speaking communities to implement innovative projects. We offer workshops, consultations, and mentoring to both cooperatives and not-for-profit organizations for long-term growth. By building strong connections and province-wide partnerships, SEEnet helps advance innovative projects that increase economic and social opportunities within English-speaking communities.





HISTORY

On December 2, 2021, the Regional Development Network (RDN) launched its social economy initiative, SEEnet—the Social Solidarity Economy English-Speaking Network.

With financial support from the Secrétariat aux relations avec les Québécois de l'expression anglaise (SRQEA) and in partnership with the Coopérative de développement régional du Québec (CDRQ), RDN undertook a two-year effort to raise awareness and access to knowledge about the potential and possibilities of the social economy in English-speaking communities and to develop a service model that will engage these communities in creating meaningful employment opportunities that contribute to sustainable economic development and enhance community vitality. RDN is committed to building strong connections and province-wide partnerships to help English speakers get involved in Québec's vibrant social economy ecosystem.

SEEnet offers a workshop program, consultations, internships, mentoring, and networking opportunities to both cooperatives and not-for-profit organizations for long-term growth.

Since our launch, we've done the following:

- Developed and offered a series of online workshops on topics related to starting and running social enterprises
- Offered one-on-one consultations with nearly 20 organizations and groups on their social economy projects
- Hired a second social economy officer (for a total of one full-time and one part-time officer)
- Launched the Social Economy Mentorship–Internship program in April 2022 with ongoing monthly placements



FACTS

Social economy enterprises play an important role in the economic and social vitality of Québec's regions where their number per capita is proportionally higher than elsewhere.

Québec has about 11 000 social economy enterprises that generate nearly \$47.8 billion in annual revenue and employ almost 220 000 individuals.
