

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An important employment sector in the province of Québec

The social economy and community action sector includes organizations (non-profit organizations and cooperatives) whose mission is to meet the needs of their members or the community rather than aiming solely for profitability.

These organizations base their actions on values of **solidarity**, **autonomy**, and **citizen participation**, and they are governed democratically.

These organizations are part of your daily life. They can be found in each of Québec's regions and make a concrete difference within their community.

There are 438,931

employees in the social economy and community action sector.¹

That's more than the total number of employees in the construction, food processing and aerospace sectors combined.

The social economy brings together enterprises emerging from collective entrepreneurship (non-profits, cooperatives or mutuals). Social economy enterprises combine both a social mission and economic activity and integrate democratic governance into their statutes and operations.

They sell products or offer services that meet a need expressed by the community or by a group of people. Profits are reinvested in the enterprise to improve working conditions or to develop new services.

Community organizations work to meet needs and aim to improve quality of life by promoting individual autonomy and fostering the development of community members. These non-profits offer collective and supportive solutions to social problems or shared needs. They are able to meet a variety of community needs that are either not filled or only partly filled by the public or private sector.

Community action can also include a percentage of income that is selfgenerated (e.g., fundraising).

SOME EXAMPLES

"The shelter provides the opportunity to create informal connections like having coffee in the morning with residents, playing with the children, or organizing weekend activities.

No two days are alike.

I may have follow-ups all day long or interviews. I may talk with partners; I may have to go to the DPJ or to court. I never know what my day will look like.

To be a good support counsellor, you need to have the ability to analyze. You need to be able to go beyond what the person says, to understand their issues, to be able to self-reflect, to think about your strengths, and to do ongoing training."

In most organizations in the sector, immigrants hold full-time jobs related to their area of expertise.

This employment sector is particularly accessible because:

- It rarely requires citizenship;
- Diplomas and experience are not the only hiring criteria: team spirit and commitment to the social mission are also valued;
- Its values of solidarity and inclusion are in line with the integration of immigrants.

In **29%** of organizations, there are, on average and per organization, 4 employees with immigrant backgrounds.

The best way to find a job in an organization in the sector is to network and be proactive. The more key people and organizations you know in the sector, the more you increase your chances of finding a job there:

- Create a LinkedIn profile and list your values in the summary section;
- Take a close interest in the organizations you like: subscribe to their newsletter and follow them on social media;
- Participate in these organizations' events and get involved as a volunteer, supporting member or administrator on a board of directors.

Volunteering pays off!

The social economy and community action sector is one of the sectors most open to citizen involvement, thanks to its participatory governance model.

- Develop or maintain services needed in your community and create jobs in your area (e.g., food markets, community radio stations, leisure and cultural services).
- Make decisions reflecting shared interests thanks to a democratic board of directors made up of citizens.
- Reinvest the profits from this project in your community.
